Criteria

5.

1. Very clear, logical structure with effective linking and very clear transitions
2. Appropriate style, professional like, well-adjusted to audience
3. Very few grammar errors
4. Excellent pronunciation
5. Advanced vocabulary, very well-adjusted to topic and audience.
6. Easy to understand, clear, confident delivery
7. Excellent slides, clear, informative and used effectively
8. Excellent in terms of eye contact and openness to audience
9. Timing excellent

4.

1. Clear, logical structure with good linking and clear transitions
2. Appropriate style, well-adjusted to audience
3. Few grammar errors
4. Very few pronunciation errors
5. Vocabulary well-adjusted to topic and audience
6. Easy to understand, clear delivery
7. Good slides, informative and referred to appropriately in talk
8. Openness to audience, eye contact
9. Good timing

3.

1. Structure generally easy to follow
2. Style not always appropriate (e.g. At times too informal or formal)
3. Some grammar errors, though not affecting the communication
4. Some mispronunciation of key terms, phonemes and/or word stress
5. Functional vocabulary, though not always adjusted to topic and audience.

Criteria for oral presentation

6. Presentation communicates
7. Visuals are there but not effectively designed/ referred to
8. Contact with the audience
9. Timing slightly off

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1. Reading aloud from text
2. Difficulties following presentation because of lack of clear structure or confusing content
3. Difficulties understanding significant portions of the presentation because of language
4. No visuals
5. Content straight from text, not re-worked for oral presentation, not very interesting for audience
6. Either much too long or too short
